Paper-I: Logic (Indian & Western)

Unit-4: Categorical Proposition and its Four Fold division, distribution of Term. Categorical Syllogism, Basic rules determining validity of syllogism and Fallacies arising as a result of the violation of those rules. Immediate inferences: conversion, obversion and contraposition. Elementary notions and principles of truth- functional logic; Techniques of symbolization; Testing validity/invalidity of an argument by Truthtable Method; Statement Forms: Tautologies, Contradictory and Contingent; Proof-construction for the validity of an argument form.
